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AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES PROGRAM

Primary Program Objectives

To fund project areas that:

- reduce greenhouse gas emissions and vehicle miles travelled (VMT), and
- increase accessibility of housing, employment centers and key destinations through low-carbon transportation options such as walking, biking and transit.
- The Cap-and-Trade Program, a key strategy for achieving the GHG emission reduction goals of AB 32, issues a limited number of GHG emissions permits (called allowances) each year. A portion of these allowances can be purchased from the State at quarterly auctions, thereby generating auction proceeds. These State auction proceeds are then deposited in the GGRF, where they become available for appropriation by the Legislature to further the purposes of AB 32.

Addition of side median creating dedicated bike and slow access lanes





Affordable Housing or Housing-Related Infrastructure

TOD Project Examples

Affordable Housing Development At least one Transportation Capital Project, such as...

Station area improvements, including bus stop benches or shelters

OR

OR

Sidewalks and dedicated bicycle paths providing connectivity between housing and a transit station

Housing-Related Infrastructure

OR

Transit signal priority technology systems





Integrated Connectivity Projects

- Must have Qualifying Transit
- May include affordable housing, but not required

Required At least one Capital Use Required One Additional Capital or Program Use



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- At least 50% of annual proceeds appropriated for affordable housing*
- At least 50% of funding to benefit Disadvantaged Communities*



 These two requirements may occur in one project (e.g. construction of affordable housing in a disadvantaged community)





Awards: Ranges & Limits

TOD

\$1-\$15 million

ICP

\$500,000-\$8 million

- Maximum award of \$15 million per funding cycle per city, city/county, or unincorporated county
- A single developer may receive no more than \$15 million per funding cycle





Statutory Thresholds

- GHG Reduction
- Supports implementation of a Sustainable Community Strategy*
- Consistent with State Planning Priorities
- Project Readiness

^{*}SB 862: "If a Sustainable Communities Strategy is not required for a region by law, a regional plan that includes policies and programs to reduce greenhouse gas emissions" will meet this requirement.





Key Thresholds


- Environmental clearances
- Entitlements and Permits
- No outstanding legal challenges to Project
- Construction has not started
- Climate Adaptation
- No conversion of working or natural resource lands

Application Scoring Criteria







- Competitive Statewide Program
 - 50% required investment in affordable housing
 - 50% required investment in disadvantaged communities
- Awarded \$121.9 million in FY 2014-15
- \$400 million available in FY 2015-16
- Eligible Applicants: Local Governments, Transportation and Transit Agencies, For- and Nonprofit Developers and **Program Operators**

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Draft Round 2 Guideline Changes

Changes under consideration

- 1. Promoting transportation improvements that support mode shift.
- Refining TOD and ICP Project Areas.
- 3. Creation of Rural Innovation Project Areas.
- 4. Housing and transportation collaboration.
- 5. Diversification of GHG Reductions scoring.
- 6. Elimination of jurisdictional dollar caps.
- 7. Promoting 4% low income housing tax credits.

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Project Type: Rural Innovation Project Area (RIPA)



Scoring Criteria: Complementary GHG Reducing Strategies - 20 points

Active Transportation Improvements – 10 points

Installation, expansion or improvement of active transportation infrastructure

Water, Energy and Greening – 10 points

 Incorporation of infrastructure components or building standards that contribute to reduction in GHG emissions





Sizing AHSC Awards Award Range: \$1 million - \$20 million

- AHD awards determined by MHP calculations
 \$55-105k/unit depending on size and AMI
 \$50,000 per restricted unit boost for 4% tax credit projects*
- HRI awards determined by # of units (limit \$50k per AHSC restricted unit, otherwise \$35k per unit)
- STI and TRA awards determined by cost of infrastructure and items.
- No jurisdictional cap.
- Developer cap raised to \$40 million total.

Other Draft Programmatic Changes

Related to eligible housing developments and costs:

- Acquisition and Rehabilitation projects exempt from minimum density requirements.
- Requirement for AHSC-funded Affordable Housing Developments (AHD) to include secure overnight bicycle parking (I space/2 units).
- Limits on AHSC funds for auto parking at AHD.
